Our aims and objectives are:

- To ensure that the Avenue of Honour is maintained at a standard befitting its status as a National Memorial.
- To plan and implement works aimed at improving the appearance, accessibility and maintenance operations at the Avenue of Honour site.
- To organize and oversee on-going fundraising activities for maintenance, improvements and activities conducted at the site.
- To raise awareness of the Avenue of Honour as a National Memorial through an active promotional campaign.
- To provide educational opportunities and resources for school children and the broader community to improve understanding of the significance of the Afghanistan conflict and its relevance to Australia's long term security.
- To ensure that the Association meets all its obligations as an incorporated body.
- To organise annual remembrance ceremonies relating to the Afghanistan war and support activities for any association or military unit that wish to hold similar ceremonies.



The Committee usually meet each month and attend to the numerous tasks that we have taken responsibility for, including overseeing the majority of the maintenance of the Avenue. The upkeep of the Illawarra Flame trees and irrigation system are the responsibility of TRC and many thanks to Don Napier and Jacob Grundling (Parks & Gardens) who are doing a great job with these duties.

We currently have a Memorandum of Understanding with Council until such time as a lease can be formally put into place. Essentially, TRC have two wonderful assets sitting side by side at Tinaburra and we have been developing a mutual working relationship with Amanda and Kris, who manage the Lakeside Motor Inn & Caravan Park. As well, we are delighted to have Chris Hartas who has recently been appointed as TRC Community Services Manager. Chris is an energetic lady who is full of enthusiasm and we look forward to working with her more closely in the future.

In the words of our President, Ray Byrnes: "While the Federal and State Governments did provide much needed 'start-up' grants for the project which were gratefully received, the great bulk of the funds required for construction and on-going maintenance of the Avenue has come from generous donations by private individuals and organisations. Therefore, to receive such generosity from so many people shows the strength of feeling and public support which this National Memorial has generated from its inception".



At the time of Remembrance Day, we had only just received our incorporation and there had been a multitude of tasks that we needed to attend to, so the Committee decided that we did not have ample time or the resources to organise an official ceremony. However, a few of us decided we would still go to the Avenue and spend some quiet time and reflect on the sacrifices that our 40 brave young men gave in the fight against terrorism in the Afghanistan conflict.

To our surprise, over 70 people from all over the Tablelands, as well as from Cairns and Townsville, just turned up! Many of these folk are parents of sons or daughters who are either currently serving in Afghanistan or have been over there. Like us, they felt that they preferred to spend Remembrance Day at the Avenue and pay their respects to the Fallen.





Another wonderful surprise we experienced on the day was when six military personnel from the 5<sup>th</sup> Aviation Regiment in Townsville flew over the Avenue at two minutes to 11 in a Chinook. These soldiers then returned later in two taxis to lay a wreath, pay their respects to the Fallen and speak with us. Captain Tye Masterson said, *"It was our pleasure to attend your fine Afghanistan Avenue of Honour. Several of the guys who attended had not been there before and found it extremely moving, particularly because they personally knew several of the fallen men honoured at the Memorial".* 

It was such a moving experience and there wasn't a solitary person there who didn't have a tear in their eyes. The AAHA Committee and those families in attendance very much appreciated the 5<sup>th</sup> Aviation Regiment's participation in making our first Remembrance Day at the Avenue such a memorable and special occasion. ### **HISTORY OF PATRIOTS AUSTRALIA**

Five serving members of the Royal Australian Navy started the Club in 1993. These people considered that there was a need for military personnel with a common love of motorcycles to have a contact point wherever they were posted. A place where they would be accepted, given accommodation and also share their passion for motorcycling.

We also have Patriots in New Zealand and the United Kingdom who provide the same welcome to members. The Australian and New Zealand Chapters both run in strict accordance with the Defence Department guidelines and we do not tolerate drugs, violence or illegal activities. We believe in the non-sexist policy promoted by the Defence Department. The Patriots are a family orientated Club and, as such, invite serving and ex-serving members to happily bring along their families to our functions.





Within the Club we have ex KOREA, Malaya, Borneo, Vietnam, Somalia, Gulf and Timor veterans, but this is not a prerequisite for membership. Full membership is open to all serving and ex-serving military personnel, and to others who have a direct bond with the military as supporters. Full membership is granted to persons who have served or are serving in the military and this includes Reserve Service. Full members must also be in possession of a motorcycle of any make and of 250cc or above, with the appropriate State Authority to ride that machine.

We ask our members to wear any awards and honours they have been awarded. Most members wear their badges of their units or trades. This provides a pictorial resume of that person's service. It also allows like members to have a common talking point. No person is permitted to wear any decoration, award, badge or insignia unless they have been awarded such decoration or served in the unit at that rank that the insignia denotes. The penalty for such an offence is the dismissal from our Club. Our members have worked too hard to gain such awards and decorations to allow abuses.

Some of our Chapters have the privilege of meeting at their local RSL Clubs where we are accepted as friends. Other Chapters have been permitted to hold their meetings within bases. That way we maintain a close link with the members of the ADF.

We have, in each State, our favourite charities that we support. In Victoria we have a close association with the Vietnam Veteran's



Museum at San Remo and we also support military functions and base open days. Our members have, for years, attended the various state Remembrance Days, Anzac Day, Long Tan Memorial Day and HMAS Sydney Memorial Day, to name just a few....and we are active in the local communities.

Our 'Badge' is to denote our love of the three services and those who died fighting for our country and shows the three services in our own particular style. The skull is for the members who paid the ultimate sacrifice for their country and the colour denotes red.

Over the past few years our Cairns Chapter has been supporters of local charities such as ARC disability service and The Long Ride which is an RAAF initiated event to raise funds for prostate cancer. As well, we



have attended the Annual Commemoration of the Battle of the Coral Sea (Cardwell), Annual Torimba Military Muster (Ravenshoe) and Townsville & Cairns attended an ANZAC Dinner hosted by Gordonvale RSL, where the Guest of Honour was LTCOL P DSC, CO SAS Regiment Recent CO of the Afghanistan Special Ops Task Force. And, of course, we attended the opening of the Afghanistan Avenue of Honour.
